Do You Have the "Right" Haggadah?

This is the time of year when people start to ask me if I have any ideas for a great Haggadah – the newest or best. In fact, I have a lot of ideas. I began a Haggadah collection when I was in rabbinical seminary, and I have tried to add interesting ones each year to that collection. Indeed, this is because the Haggadah is one of the most interesting, unique, enduring literary works in Jewish tradition. How so?

The word Haggadah means "telling," or more accurate to the scenario, "retelling." The following is written in the forward of one of my favorite editions, New American Haggadah:

"The Haggadah has been translated more widely, and reprinted more often, than any other Jewish book. It is not a work of history or philosophy, not a prayer book, user's manual, timeline, poem, or palimpsest – and yet it is all of these things. The Torah is the foundational text for Jewish law, but the Haggadah is our book of living memory. We are not merely telling a story here. We are being called to a radical act of empathy. Here we are, embarking on an ancient, perennial attempt to give human life – our lives – dignity....

As you read these words – as our people's ink-stained fingers turn its wine-stained pages – new Haggadahs are being written. And, as future Jews at future tables read those Haggadahs, other Haggadahs will be written. New Haggadahs will be written until there are no more Jews to write them."

We write and re-write, we tell and retell. It is in doing this that we cultivate our empathy for others, understand our own beings, and discern the context and meaning of it all. As we approach the rebirth of springtime alongside the bursting azaleas, we apprehend our own blooming and becoming. The seder makes order of that chaos, and the Haggadah reflects our own voice in that process.

And, so every Haggadah is a good one. It is the signature of every Jew attempting to define and redefine the significance of our story. I wish you a very sweet Pesach, filled with great stories, delicious food, and lively company. And, if you will be joining us for our annual Second Night Seder, I will very much look forward to sharing in that moment with you. In the meantime you are invited to join me for the next Spiritual Parenthood workshop on April 6, to learn about making your own fun family Seders.



From the Educator


In the fall, I received a handwritten letter from an address I didn't recognize. It was from Charlize Brooks, a fifth grader at Woodlake Elementary School in Sacramento, CA. She was writing on behalf of her class and her teacher, who is presenting her students with lessons of tolerance, which includes a unit on The Holocaust. They are participating in a Bandage Project. Their Bandage Project is a collection of bandages which represent the 1.5 million children killed in the Holocaust. Many organizations have sent the class packages of bandages, in fact the class has already collected over 500,000. Their goal is to collect 1.5 million. Charlize writes, "Bandages come in all shapes, sizes, and colors. And most of all, they heal pain." I contacted her teacher right away and promised that we too, would be part of their collection in the spring around the time of Yom Hashoah – Holocaust Remembrance Day. I saved the letter and looked at it so many times this year thinking about Charlize and her class and anticipating the day when we at Touro Synagogue Religious School will be part of their Bandage Project too.

Yom Hashoah is a time of remembering, but also a time of the year when we can appreciate the lessons and education of openness, diversity, and love of all people. Starting the first week in April until the end of the school year on May 4th, we will collect boxes of bandages for Mrs. Liss' "Tolerance Kids" class. Bring them to the General Pershing entrance and place them in the box marked "Tolerance Kids Bandage Project." Sign your name on the box every time you




