## A Message from Rabbi Todd Silverman

## Dear soon-to-be friends, colleagues, and fellow New Orleanians,

It is a true joy to be writing you all in order to introduce myself to the Touro Synagogue family. I have had the pleasure of meeting and getting to know a good number of you so far, and I look forward to continuing that process come this summer, when I make the move down south to the Crescent City, the Big Easy, America's Most Interesting City. Having spent only a few days visiting the area with time both inside and outside the synagogue walls, I can tell you that I am already quite happily smitten with the vibe of the city and the friendliness of its people, and I am eager to become part of the community as Touro's new Rabbinic Director of Lifelong Learning. But before I get too far into my thoughts on joining the team, I think a bit about who I am is in order.

I am moving to New Orleans from Los Angeles, where I have lived for the last ten years. Before that, though, I was born and raised in Clifton Park, New York, a medium-sized town halfway between Albany and Saratoga. My parents, siblings and I lived an active Jewish life, with my parents taking part in our synagogue's Men's Club and Sisterhood, and my siblings and I attending the religious school from elementary school through our becoming Bar and Bat Mitzvah. Eventually, all three of us Silverman kids joined the nearby Reform synagogue's temple youth group in order to have access to our local and regional NFTY groups. Through it, we began our affiliation with Jewish summer camps. I attended and then worked at the URJ's teen leadership program, Kutz Camp, in Warwick, NY for seven years, only taking a break to travel to Israel with NFTY during one summer in high school. After graduation, I attended college at the State University of New York (SUNY) College at Oswego on the shores of Lake Ontario, where I studied theater and was active in our small (but mighty!) Jewish Student Union.

After finishing my undergraduate degree at SUNY Oswego, I moved myself west to Los Angeles for two important reasons: First, I needed to escape the harrowing experience of "lake effect snow" (it's a real thing!) which Lake Ontario offers its residents from late fall through springtime, and second, I landed myself a job as an assistant teacher (and later as lead teacher) at Brawerman Elementary School, a Jewish Day School in West Los Angeles, where I discovered my love

and talent for teaching. After four transformative years teaching 4th grade at Brawerman, it was finally time for me to start my most recent academic journey which I will wrap up this coming May - attending the Reform Movement's graduate seminary program at Hebrew Union College (HUC), first in Jerusalem (where I became friends with a fresh-faced cantorial student named David Mintz) and then back in Los Angeles. My course of study at HUC has led me to wade (and dive!) into a wide range of Jewish topics, including history, theology, text, language, pastoral work, and education, to name just a few. And it is the love of learning, teaching, and community that drew me toward Touro Synagogue and its wonderfully warm, engaging, welcoming leaders whom I met for the first time only a few weeks ago.

Although my time at Touro Synagogue has yet to officially begin, I can tell you that I am beyond excited to join this fabulous community of interested, interesting, engaged Jews. From the leadership with whom I have discussed educational philosophies and shared visions, to the congregants with whom I have studied and prayed, to the young learners with whom I have spent time seeking out all the coolest spots in the synagogue to connect with God, I am already getting a sense of just how special a place Touro is. It is my sincerest hope that each of you come by to introduce yourselves to me and share what you love most about Touro, so I can continue to learn more about what binds us together and activates each of you to play a part in the life of the community. See y'all in July!

## President's Message

The shift from mandatory dues to voluntary support is a success! Given the choice, most of us behave as we do in a restaurant: when the "tip line" is left blank, we step-up and contribute the same or more than the otherwise pre-determined rate. And that has proven true here. In our first year of voluntary support we are expecting to exceed our budgeted member support target! Also, given the freedom to self-assess, funds have come in more quickly than ever. In the past, we have had to call some of you to remind you to send along your support dollars, creating a substantial time burden for our office staff and often necessitating involvement of members of our finance committee. While procrastination has not been entirely eradicated, human nature being what it is, the reality is that the number of late-payers is dramatically reduced. Our only regret is that we lacked the foresight to envision and effect this positive change sooner!

Our switch to voluntary support has created a number of what I will call "values" or "identity" issues. In an earlier column, I pointed out that a committee has been empanelled to study the issue of whether we should require congregational membership in order to be entitled to attend High Holiday services (except students and out-of-town visitors). This is not an easy question to answer and no solution or change will occur (if ever) before the upcoming Holidays. Study of the issue has taken longer than anticipated and is on-going.

On somewhat of a related plane is the question of weddings. Should a 30-year-old young man or woman who grew up at Touro and whose parents are members be entitled to be married by our clergy if he or she has chosen not to join the congregation? Should a young couple be entitled to a free wedding six months after joining? What if they only pay \$18 in voluntary support but are planning a society section headlining gala reception? Should weddings be a free benefit of membership for any/all members? Should our clergy ever be available to conduct weddings for non-members, and, if so, at what cost? Viewed through a lens where all persons can easily join at a self-assessed rate, these difficult questions will be explored carefully and with great sensitivity to our traditions, values and mission. As this process unfolds, any creation of or changes to policy will be shared and explained.

In the meanwhile, it has recently come to my attention that more than a few persons celebrating simchas such as weddings, b'nai mitzvah, brit milah and naming ceremonies choose not to make a gift of any kind to our clergy's discretionary funds. The hard work that is involved in the loving preparation for these celebrations of life is a privilege of membership. Particularly in the case of weddings and B'nai Mitzvah, many hours of work are invested by our clergy to ensure the personalized beauty each event and its participants deserve. Is a financial payment to clergy required – no, it's not. However, in years past, the vast majority of us showed our appreciation by means of a donation to the discretionary fund of the Rabbi or Cantor. On the assumption that some of us were unaware of this custom of showing appreciation, I politely share the foregoing observation.



April Dates: 7, 14, 21, & 28


12:30 p.m. – 1:30 p.m. for Hebrew Reading and Exploration

Adrien Genet is uniquely qualified to serve as Touro's resident historian and tour guide. A fifth generation congregant on her mom's side and a fourth generation congregant on her dad's side, Adrien's family connections run deep. She is even related (by marriage) to our namesake and benefactor Judah Touro. "Growing up I remember sitting in the sanctuary and loving the grandeur of it and the smell," she said when asked about her favorite Touro memory.

For the past 20 years Adrien has shown off our synagogue to out-of-towners, local schools, youth groups and anyone interested in learning the history behind Touro. "I love having the Catholic schools come and realize what we're all about," Adrien said. "I try to be a good ambassador for Touro and Judaism." In addition to giving tours, Adrien also researches families at the Tulane archives,



schedules tour coverage for our other volunteer docents, and is a fountain of knowledge on all things Touro and New Orleans.

Adrien's grandchildren are seventh generation Touro congregants and she is grateful that they are able to continue her family's tradition.



## News from JewCCY



Our JewCCY Board frequently talks about how to make new members comfortable at events. We try our best to welcome everyone with open arms to show just how great JewCCY can be. This is actually something fairly easy we are tasked with on a local level. There is ease in welcoming 5-10 new members to one of our awesome events. What about on a larger scale? When JewCCY members travel to NFTY Southern events there is an expectation that our members, new and old, will be warmly welcomed by the leadership. This warmth and sense of hospitality is what keeps JewCCY members returning to NFTY Southern events.

I had the pleasure over Mardi Gras weekend to attend the NFTY Convention in Atlanta, Georgia. Three of our teens made the decision to attend convention, and from the thoughts we shared, it was well worth the experience. It was humbling to witness our teens from New Orleans and all over the Deep South interacting with teens from New York to LA (although later proclaiming what we all know - it is a LOT more original to be a Jew from the South!).

When our region met as a group, our 14 NFTY-SO teens reflected on the challenges of being a newcomer from a region with a smaller presence. The teens reflected on meeting the challenge of making new friends in such a large community (over 1,000 NFTY participants), and how they would love to bring that same hospitality back to their local youth groups and to future NFTY Southern events. Regional Advisor, Becci Jacobs shared her thoughts, "Our teens who attended convention gained a new sense of pride about what it means to be a Jewish teen, and the importance of creating a Southern presence at North American events."

If you are reading this article, and have not made the decision to attend a JewCCY or NFTY Southern event, give it a try. While there are lots of extracurricular activities to be involved in, there are few where one will feel as welcome or proud of their identity than NFTY.






Eden House is proud to
