#### **Ongoing Revelation -**It's Still Happening

The story goes like this: Atop Mt. Sinai, amid peals of thunder and flashes of lightening, enough to illuminate the land all around, God delivered words to Moses. Moses then retold those words to Joshua and the elders, who delivered the words to the prophets and sages of our tradition. They have delivered it to us.

Some people think this story of revelation sounds like a giant game of "telephone." Remember

that game? When someone whispers a message into the ear of the person next to her, and then so on...until it gets to the end. When it gets to the last person, and the message is spoken, everyone erupts in laughter because of how messed up the original message became.

That is why Jewish philosophers have offered another take on the revelation experience. Some say revelation in Judaism is not transmitted by the proverbial whisper in the ear from one generation to the next. It is not the case that there was only one original word spoken, and each generation is farther from that one truth. In fact, just the opposite.

"In Judaism, revelation is an ongoing phenomenon." These are the words of Dr. Ron Wolfson, visionary educator. "The giving of Torah only began at Sinai; Torah is revealed to us continuously." What does this mean? Did you hear Torah today? You might have.

Ongoing revelation is a huge insight into how we consider encounters in the world. Should we try to remember and retain all that was said once atop a mountain long ago? Or, are we to continue to listen to voices of wisdom and understanding – expecting to hear new perceptions. And, receiving these new perceptions with the same attitude of holiness as we did way back then.

There is a lot of change around Touro Synagogue. Are we desecrating the past by making these changes? Are we now transmitting only garbled perversions of what was once declared as immutable? Or can this leg of the journey be seen as an unfolding of the next iteration of sacred pursuit?

As Jews, we do not delete or forget the words spoken on Sinai. In fact, quite the opposite – we read them every week as we open the Torah scroll. And, we interpret them. We add our voices. And, we even boldly admit that some of those words speak to a culture that has become part of our indelible, revered history.

This is a brave and difficult time. I know there is some sadness. And, there is some eager anticipation for what is to come. Both sadness and eagerness, we know well, can exist side by side.

I am honored to be with you as we all listen to the ongoing revelation that is happening now, in the 186th year of Touro Synagogue's inspiring lifetime.







#### A RABBI'S APPRECIATION OF THE WORLD'S RELIGIONS

In the wake of 9/11, globalization, and the interplay of religion, politics, and social policy, it is increasingly important for us to understand the religions of the world on their own terms as well as from a Jewish perspective. In this five session course, Rabbi Gerson will be exploring, in sequence, Christianity, Mormonism, Islam, Sufism, Baha'i, Hinduism, Buddhism, Zoroastrianism, Jainism, Sikhism, Confucianism, Taoism, Shintoism, Native American religion, Wicca and Scientology. Drawing on his life-long study of the world's religions, Rabbi Gerson hopes to bring order and meaningful understanding of these many religious paths.



Rabbi Gary S. Gerson is a graduate of the Lee Honors College of Western Michigan University (B.A. Magna Cum Laude, 1967), Temple University (M.A., Religion, 1976, and M.A., Psychology, 1977), The Reconstructionist Rabbinical College (Rabbi, 1976), and The Chicago Theological Seminary (Doctor of Ministry, 1984). He is also certified by the Family Therapy Training Center of the Philadelphia Child Guidance Clinic. In 1967, he was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship grant for study in India and Japan, and in 1969, a graduate fellowship for study at the Hebrew University, Jerusalem.

Dr. Gerson served as Senior Rabbi of Oak Park Temple B'nai Abraham Zion, Oak Park, Illinois, a position he held from 1979 to 2009.

Now a man of leisure, he and his wife Carol spend a great deal of time in New Orleans, especially during the winter, and are active in the Touro Torah Study Group as well as the Touro Choir.

#### From the Educator

married in his life, nor did Catherine.

This January 8, New Orleans will commemorate the Bicentennial of the Battle of New Orleans. Two hundred years ago in early January, Judah Touro fought in that battle and was gravely wounded. He recovered, slowly, with the help and patient friendship of Rezin Shepard. Touro was said to have been left with a limp from the wound, but this did not stop him from focusing on his business ventures and saving a fortune that would benefit our congregation. Also in January, on January 13 to be exact, 160 years ago, Judah Touro died. He is not buried in New Orleans, rather in his home of Newport, RI, but his name lives on here and in many places by virtue of his philanthropy. Each January, we hear his name read as we observe his Yahrzeit. I walk by Judah Touro's portrait almost daily. There is something so intriguing about his hat.

Judah Touro was born in Newport, RI to Hazzan Isaac Touro and Reyna (nee) Hays. The Touros were affluent, but after the Revolutionary War, the economy of Newport tanked and the Touros moved to Jamaica, British West Indies, where they lived in poverty. Isaac Touro died soon after, so Judah's' mother and siblings moved to Boston to live with Reyna's brother Moses Michael Hays and family. From Hays, Judah learned business practices, and soon moved to New Orleans to invest in real estate and the import business. Some say that Judah moved away from the Hays household because he was in love with his first cousin, Catherine Hays. Interestingly, Judah Touro never

Judah saved money religiously in his lifetime, but he was not a religious observer. After strengthening his friendship with Shepard, and also developing a friendship with Gershon Kursheedt, a northern Jew and early leader in New Orleans congregational life, they convinced Touro to care more about Judaism and support Jewish organizations. So he did, leaving money to start Touro Infirmary, Nefushot Yehudah, and other national and non-Jewish causes and charities all around the country.

This January, our Uptown Hebrew School Late Nite program will focus on "Touro Pride." Students will not only hear more about the history of Touro Synagogue (and before), but eat dinner with Judah Touro himself (or at least someone who will impersonate him). It will be a night to commemorate and celebrate what makes our synagogue unique and special and a place to be especially proud of.

And there is more to come. So we need your help.


All volunteers are welcome, especially religious school parents, because we harvest on Sunday mornings during school. You're there anyway.
