A Message From Our Cantor

In the spring of 1992, Johnny Carson retired from The Tonight Show, Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot went on Larry King Live and announced his candidacy for the presidency, and Cantor Steven Dubov (z"l) created a one-of-a kind Shabbat service, aiming to capture the spirit of New Orleans. And the rest is Jazz Fest Shabbat history.

For the first few years, however, Jazz Fest Shabbat wasn't actually called Jazz Fest Shabbat. At that time, Touro Synagogue presented "The Jazz & Heritage Festival Sabbath Worship," which by and large, looked a lot like a typical Shabbat service at Touro. With klezmer as the natural combination of Jazz and Jewish music, The New Orleans Klezmer All-Star Band was invited to perform various klezmer selections at the beginning and end of the service.



In the years that followed, however, the klezmer aesthetic blended closer to true New Orleans Jazz. Klezmer All-Star band leader, Ben Schenk, returned with his new group, Panorama Jazz Band, which still plays with us to this day. In addition, Panorama was joined by guest artists like Ellis Marsalis, Jeremy Davenport, Kermit Ruffins, Allen Toussaint, Irma Thomas, and this last year, Preservation Hall Jazz Band. Of course, Jazz Fest Shabbat has become so much more than an incredible musical performance; it brings all that is wonderful about Shabbat at Touro Synagogue together with the pulse, heartbeat and essence of New Orleans.

Before moving to New Orleans and joining the Touro community, I didn't know quite what to expect for my first Jazz Fest Shabbat experience. I'd heard the stories of years past; stories of Mardi Gras Indians marching down the aisles, and of the sanctuary filled to the brim to hear Irma Thomas. I'd even seen the YouTube clip of Allen Toussaint and Paul Shafer playing an impromptu dueling pianos version of Adon Olam. None of these stories, however, adequately prepared me for the spiritual and emotional heights that we achieve together for this truly unique, truly New Orleans experience. None of these stories could have given me a glimpse for how fortunate and grateful I would feel to be part of a community that comes together to make that experience possible.

This year, we'll be celebrating twenty-five years since Cantor Dubov first invited the Klezmer All-Stars to come to Touro Synagogue. I can't help but think about Cantor Dubov and the legacy he left behind at Touro. I can't help but wonder

what he might have thought about the impact of the seeds he planted, and how this has grown into something so special, beautiful and meaningful for our community and beyond. When Jon Cleary and the Absolute Monster Gentlemen join us for the 25th Annual Jazz Fest Shabbat on April 29th, I know that I'll be thinking of Cantor Dubov and the many others who have given endless time, passion, energy and resources to help build and sustain Jazz Fest Shabbat.

Touro Shines as an Example for Notre Dame University Research Team

Sometimes it might feel hard to see or know or feel the mitzvot we as a congregation are engaged in through our housing of start-up charter schools and in our partnership with Sophie B. Wright. A Notre Dame research team with a keen understanding of what is going on across the nation recently gave us an outside lens to remind us: Touro is making a difference in public education in this city, in the lives of children, and therefore, in the future of New Orleans.

As an extension of the Gates Foundation's Expectations Project, researchers at the University of Notre Dame are looking at the sociology of education on one hand, the sociology of faith institutions on the other hand, and what is happening across the nation when those two hands join in relationship. Their starting assumption is that there is a moral imperative to ensure that all children are deserving of a free, quality education. Their initial research is looking at what happens

when faith institutions get involved in support of public education. What does it look like? What's the impact? What's the reality in specifics?

A member of a Notre Dame team of researchers got in touch with Touro and spoke with Teri Hunter to learn more about and discuss Touro's partnership with Sophie B. Wright Charter School and our housing of new, incubating Charter Schools. Touro is one of the few Jewish congregations in the country that they have uncovered as currently engaged in active efforts with public education.

In summary, Touro's vision and execution and dynamic relationship with SBW and with the new charter schools Touro has housed and now houses is unique to what the research team has found across the country. Deep admiration was expressed for what Touro is doing in both very small and very big ways to positively impact public education. The researcher with whom Teri Hunter spoke said he was

energized by Touro's example. Touro now will be a part of the team's report to the Gates Foundation and will be a significant and shining model of what is possible when faith based institutions take action to support public education in a variety of ways. The Notre Dame team expects that the second phase of their work will outline ways to large scale replicate and leverage the faith based models, including Touro, that they believe are making a difference in unique ways in public education.

May we all take pride in the role our congregation is playing to that end. And give thanks to the team at Notre Dame for recognizing us and reminding us of the mitzvot we are performing.

You might be wondering about a new sign outside our restrooms. As part of our efforts to create a welcoming and inclusive environment at Touro Synagogue, an upstairs restroom has been designated as "gender-neutral". Gender-neutral restrooms are beneficial for those who are gender-nonconforming or do not identify as men or women. They are also important for parents or caregivers who are offering assistance to someone of a different gender, and those who desire more privacy than our communal bathrooms afford.

We recognize that the upstairs location is not ideal, especially for those with physical disabilities, and ask for your understanding regarding the limitations on our historic structure. We welcome your suggestions for further improvement.
