A Letter From Jerry Silverman President and CEO of the Jewish Federations of North America

Dear Colleagues,

As the scope of the impact of Hurricane Harvey on the Houston area and other area becomes clearer we are dramatically escalating our emergency response. You will be receiving regular updates from us about the various facets of the response but we want to focus you on three immediate things we need your help with:

Funding – the funding needs of this situation are going to be enormous and long-term. It will be days or even into next week before anyone can even begin to assess because the rain and flooding have not stopped. But we know already this is on the magnitude of Katrina and Sandy impacts. We will have immediate cash needs to address by the end of the week; please forward funds from initial fundraising or emergency grants immediately. And please use these next days to focus people in your communities on responding generously, and to calibrate your emergency grant processes accordingly. We have already reached out to the Jewish Funders Network and several major Jewish foundations for support.

Boots on the Ground – we plan to put a team of senior professionals on the ground by the end of the week to help support the community's immediate emergency efforts. This will involve tracking down where community members have ended up; distributing emergency cash grants and Home Depot vouchers; and helping local agencies get back up and running. We are close to finalizing who this will be for the first week but we will likely need to sustain this over several weeks. If you have senior professionals who are ready and available for week-long deployments starting next week or beyond please let your local Federation know ASAP -https://jewishnola.com/harvey

Coordination – a disaster of this magnitude requires the highest possible degree of coordination so that time and efforts aren't wasted or duplicated. We need to be able to support and enable the local community leadership to drive the efforts. It won't be helpful for people to just show up unplanned. We urge you in the strongest possible way to avoid our tendency to fragment efforts and customize responses. Houston's leadership is overwhelmed in the moment and can't possibly respond to individual offers of assistance. Our impact will be greatest if we can coordinate a system-wide response and this is what Houston wants and needs from us all.

USEFUL ORGANIZATIONS

GENERAL RELIEF:

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner established a Harvey relief fund at **The Greater Houston Community Foundation (www.ghcf.org/hurricane-relief)**. The organization connects donors with a network of nonprofits and innovative solutions in the social sector.

GlobalGiving (www.globalgiving.org), which calls itself the largest global crowdfunding community, has a goal of raising \$2 million for its Harvey relief fund. Funds will be used first for immediate needs of food, water and shelter and then transition to long-term recovery efforts.

United Way of Greater Houston (www.unitedwayhouston.org) has launched a relief fund for storm-related needs and recovery. The organization says it already maintains a disaster relief fund but anticipates the needs of Harvey will far exceed those existing resources.

The Center for Disaster Philanthropy (www.disasterphilanthropy.org) has also launched a Hurricane Harvey relief fund. The organization says its strategy emphasizes "investing well rather than investing quickly, addressing the greatest needs and gaps in funding that may be yet to emerge."

GoFundMe (www.gofundme.com/hurricaneharvey), the social fundraising site, has created a landing page that gathers the campaigns on its platform related to Harvey.

The Salvation Army (www.helpsalvationarmy.org) says it is providing food and water to first responders and preparing for massive feeding efforts for residents.

Send Relief and Southern Baptist Disaster Relief (www.namb.net) says its teams began responding before Harvey made landfall and continues on-the-ground relief work.

Samaritan's Purse (www.samaritanspurse.org) is accepting donations as well as volunteers for Harvey disaster relief for the coming months.

BLOOD:

As well as the American Red Cross (www.redcross.org/give-blood), local organizations accepting blood donations are Carter BloodCare (www.carterbloodcare.org/donate-blood) and the South Texas Blood & Tissue Center (www.donatingforlife.org).

SHELTER:

Coalition for the **Homeless of Houston/Harris County (www.homelesshouston.org/take-action/donate**) coordinates the city's response to homelessness, serving as "a backbone organization" to groups that offer direct service. It has been providing updated information on shelters with available beds.

Airbnb (www.airbnb.com/disaster/hurricaneharveyevacuees) has set up an urgent accommodations site, where people can open their homes to evacuees from the storm or find shelter themselves. Service fees are waived for those who check in by Sept. 1.

FOOD:

A number of food banks will be aiding the affected region. Consider donating money instead of food, as it allows a food bank to use your donation most efficiently.

Feeding Texas(donatenow.networkforgood.org/feeding-texas) is a statewide nonprofit that works alongside state and federal relief efforts. The organization says it steps in during major disasters to "coordinate with the state and other providers so that relief reaches families quickly and the 'second disaster' of an unorganized response is avoided."

PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES:

Portlight Strategies (http://www.portlight.org) facilitates projects involving people with disabilities, including post-disaster relief work. The organization says its hotline for Inclusive Disaster Strategies has received urgent requests from people in need.

KIDS:

Save the Children (www.savethechildren.org) is providing relief supplies and services to help children and families in shelters and other victims of Hurricane Harvey.

The Texas Diaper Bank (texasdiaperbank.networkforgood.com), based in San Antonio, works to meet the basic needs of vulnerable babies, children with disabilities, and seniors. It focuses on providing partner agencies with diapers and goods.

KIPPHouston Public Schools (kipphouston.org/blog/family-emergency-fund) has set up a Family Emergency Fund to provide direct support to their staff and families in need. 100% of funds will go directly to KIPP families and staff who need it most.

ANIMALS:

The SPCA of Texas (www.spca.org/hurricane-harvey) is organizing evacuations of pets in Texas (including 123 cats from a shelter in Corpus Christi) and offers resources on pet-friendly housing for evacuees.

Austin Pets Alive! (www.austinpetsalive.org) says it has transported more than 235 animals to its shelter. The organization seeks donations, as well as people who can adopt animals. It says it has received so many donated supplies that it's running out of storage space, so financial donations are what it needs most.

LEGAL AID:

Texas Legal Aid (www.teajf.org) - To provide direct assistance to a legal related situation, consider assisting Texas Legal Aid, a pro bono group that helps victims put their lives back together. After a disaster, Legal Aid helps put lives back together by providing:

- Assistance with securing FEMA and other benefits available to disaster survivors
- Assistance with life, medical and property insurance claims
- Help with home repair contracts and contractors
- Replacing wills and other important legal documents destroyed in the disaster
- Assisting in consumer protection matters, remedies and procedures
- Assisting with mortgage/foreclosure and landlord/tenant problems

The Texas Access to Justice Foundation will use all donations to fund Disaster Legal Aid to survivors of Hurricane Harvey. Please donate to the Hurricane Harvey Legal Aid Fund to assist all Texans in need of these essential services.
