MISSION AND PRIORITIES TASK FORCE REPORT

A MESSAGE FROM LAURA LEVY CHAIR, MISSION AND PRIORITIES TASK FORCE

Late last summer, following Rabbi Bauman's arrival, Lisa Herman asked me to chair a new working group, the Mission and Priorities Task Force. Lisa charged the Task Force to develop renewed Vision and Mission Statements that reflect our core values as a congregation, our goals and aspirations, and to recommend and prioritize approaches to reach them. The Task Force of eighteen members was appointed. We began with a planning session at the Board of Trustees retreat last August and have been meeting in earnest

throughout the year, albeit via Zoom in recent months. The process we used was highly consultative. We made use of valuable congregational input collected last year from Town Hall meetings and surveys that had been conducted during the search for our new rabbi. Many of you participated in those processes to articulate our goals and aspirations together. This information was very helpful. We also solicited input from constituencies of the congregation including the Board of Trustees, Executive Committee, Past Presidents, and Chairs of standing committees. Rabbi Bauman, Rabbi Silverman, Cantor Margolius, and Kerry Tapia participated actively in the process. We are prepared now, indeed eager, to share our new Vision and Mission statements and the articulation of goals and priorities for the coming years.

The new Vision and Mission statements emphasize our role as *Beit Knesset, Beit T'filah, Beit Midrash, Beit Tikkun Olam,* and *Beit Ahava*. They also reflect our core values as articulated a few years ago: *Transformative Prayer, Expansive Thought, Fearless Engagement, and Love.* Guided by our work on these statements, we clustered the major activities of the synagogue into six major areas: *Congregational Engagement, Operations, Fiscal Sustainability, Education, Social Justice,* and *Sacred Duties and Pastoral Care.*

Through our discussions, it became clear that the area of Sacred Duties and Pastoral Care is foundational, providing meaning, context and direction for all we do. The lifecycle moments, prayer services, holiday observances, support during difficult times, and other sacred duties are the privileges and responsibility of our clergy. They will continue to plan and set priorities in this area as they do every day, ongoing. We also came to view Social Justice as an operating philosophy that is cross-cutting through all we do, integrated within and supportive of the other strategic areas. Social justice is the lens we apply to the priorities and activities that define us, truly an essential element of a congregation oriented around justice and equality. For this reason, social justice goals and priorities are embedded in the



planning for all other strategic areas. As depicted above, those areas are drawn as overlapping, intended to emphasize the mutually supportive nature of our major activities. Subgroups of the Task Force were identified to address each strategic area, and to consider goals, needs, and priorities, both short-term and longer-term, for the next five years. This effort resulted in a thoughtful inventory of our strengths, our needs, our opportunities, and an articulation of successful outcomes we envision in each area. The final product includes prioritized recommendations to help us actualize our goals over the coming years. A summary of this report is available to you on our website at https://bit.ly/3jJHhpN. HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS

A MESSAGE FROM RABBI BAUMAN

Dear Touro Synagogue Family,

The irony that this year's High Holidays - one of our most ancient traditions - will be the first of their kind is really

remarkable. In 5781, the path we will walk will be a blessing and an inspiration to those who come after us. To that end, I'd like to make a few suggestions as we prepare our own home sanctuaries for the holidays. I'm hopeful that one or more will speak to you and support you as you join the congregation from your home.

Prepare the space where you will be praying. Perhaps set up chairs ahead of time in front of your screen, whether computer, tablet, or television. Determine which direction in the room is East (downtown for most of us) so you can face it at certain times. Make sure you have your prayer book and Book of Remembrance nearby. Please plan to check out a High Holiday Siddur (prayer book) from Touro in the coming weeks. For an online version of Mishkan HaNefesh or to purchase your own copy, please visit www.ccarnet.org/publications/hhd. (The Book of Remembrance and High Holiday Meditations booklet will arrive at your home by mail in the coming weeks. They will also be available as a PDF on our website.)

Shelter service times from other time commitments and pressures. When we're gathered in the synagogue, this is easier to do. But it's important to try and do it at home as well. Turn off devices and alerts, clear your schedule of work of any kind, and plan to be in the moment - Jewish time connects us across all space.

Enliven your sense for the High Holidays. This may mean wearing particular clothing or jewelry that sets the day apart. If you have a tallit, this is a great time to wear it - it's customary on Rosh Hashanah morning, Kol Nidre, and all day on Yom Kippur.

Perhaps having something in the oven that will make the house smell like Rosh Hashanah. Perhaps it's surrounding yourself with visual reminders of your Jewish heritage.

Don't "watch" the service. Participate in it! Having services on a screen may prime us to think of them as some sort of show. We should be intentional about keeping them out of that realm. Read aloud, sing with Cantor, bend or sway at appointed times. It is our mindset that will break through the physical separation we'll experience.

Include your children when you can. Many have powerful memories of being in synagogue with our parents. Sometimes those memories include feeling bored or fidgety, but I imagine they also include curiosity and emotional attachment to this adult experience our elders were having that we were privy to. This is a great opportunity to include our children without any worry of them disturbing others or being there too long. And to help with that, we have prepared and will make available some holiday-themed materials for our youngest members so that they can find ways to express themselves during prayer services.

Through our commitment and determination, we will welcome our holidays despite the challenges, and when we do, we will add our voices to the glorious chorus of our people who have always been defined by creativity and resilience. Nothing has ever kept our people from celebrating who we are and where we've come from, and that will be as true this year as ever.

ROSH HASHANAH ROCKS ASTURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26

K'tanim families (Kindergarten and under): Shabbat morning, September 26 will be a *Rosh Hashanah Rocks*! We'll gather in the Bowsky Garden to celebrate the New Year and hear the blast of the shofar.

DAYS OF AWE, DAYS OF MEMORY



A MESSAGE FROM CANTOR MARGOLIUS

There is a moment each summer when, for me as a cantor, I begin to feel how apt the name "Days of Awe" is for the High Holiday season. It usually occurs sometime in August as I'm preparing for our services and rehearsing Avinu Malkeinu in the

sanctuary for the first time in almost a year. The music Max Janowski composed is breathtakingly beautiful, but that's not why this moment moves me. After all, there are plenty of beautiful songs. Instead, without fail, the melody reminds me of my very first Rosh Hashanah service, and I find myself transported back to my childhood.

Sitting next to my mother, we could feel the vibrations in the room as the first deep low notes of the prayer rang out from the organ. She held my hand and whispered in my ear, "I love this so much." I understood what it meant to feel awe.

Every year since, I have entered the New Year on Rosh Hashanah not with the setting sun or the candle lighting or the first shofar blast, but with the first notes of *Avinu Malkeinu*. When that moment arrives, a part of me is also sitting in the light peach upholstered chairs of my hometown synagogue, sitting next to my mother.

This year, as we enter the High Holidays, everything will surely feel different from years past. But we also have an opportunity, especially this year, to invite in the memories that truly make this the Season of Awe. Each prayer is overflowing with meaning from the words on the pages of our *Machzor* and from the hands held and smiles shared across the room that we hold in our hearts from years past. When we incorporate the power of memory, then the transformative prayers of our liturgy and the love of this community — the things that truly matter — will all be there for us.

In the words of the traditional closing benediction on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur morning:

Hayom t'amtzeinu - Strengthen us on this day.
Hayom t'varcheinu - Bless us today.
Hayom tidr'sheinu l'tovah - Grant us goodness today.
Hayom tishma shavateinu - Hear our heartfelt words on this day.
Hayom t'kabeil b'rachamim uvratzon et t'filateinu - On this day, receive our prayers with love.

May we find in these Days of Awe the strength and blessing and goodness we seek.



EREV ROSH HASHANAH

Rosh Hashanah often begins with a family meal usually accompanied by a round challah and apples dipped in honey. Before the Erev Rosh Hashanah meal, the following blessings are recited:

YOM KIPPUR

Yom Kippur usually begins and ends with a meal shared by family and friends. The meal is eaten before sundown and includes the blessing over the bread but not the blessing over wine. Also before sundown, in memory of deceased family and friends, yahrzeit candles are lit that will burn throughout Yom Kippur. After the meal, two holiday candles are lit with the following blessing. This marks the beginning of Yom Kippur.
