
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From Our President



A Message from Laura Levy

Dear Friends,

I hope you enjoyed a happy, healthy summer with family, friends, and perhaps a special vacation. The gift of Summer Union Shabbat has been a joy this year as always, especially the opportunity to worship together with our neighbors at Temple Sinai and Congregation Gates of Prayer. We look forward with excitement

to returning to "business as usual" at our own Touro Synagogue when the building opens in September. As I write this letter, we are closely watching the final phase of our extraordinary renovation project with eager anticipation of its completion in the next few weeks. Because of the many devoted and loving congregants who contributed so generously to the Lifting the Sky Campaign, we will soon enjoy beautifully designed and renovated spaces that will serve us well for many years. This project is such a gift for all of us. Please mark your calendars for a special Sukkot Havdalah on October 19 where we will celebrate the opening of the building and express deepest gratitude to the many congregants who made the project possible through their generosity. In addition to their extraordinary gifts to the Campaign, a remarkable group of dedicated congregants gave their time and their skills so generously to this project. In particular, the Campaign Co-Chairs (Susan and Lou Good, Ruth and Larry Kullman, and Beth and Austin Lavin) have poured themselves into the project to ensure its success. We will have the opportunity during the High Holy Days to honor the Co-Chairs and express our gratitude as a congregation.

In the meantime, even while most of our building is inaccessible, our committees have been working actively to provide programs of value for us and the broader community. I share here just a few examples among many:

- The Membership Committee under Julie Koppman's able leadership has initiated a new Ambassador Program. For new and recently joined members, even for long-time members, the program seeks to foster a culture of belonging at Touro a culture where members feel noticed, named, known, and needed. Programs have been established to host social events, greet us at Shabbat worship and dinner, and support the development of congregant groups based on a variety of affinities. The Ambassadors have also developed a terrific set of FAQ's that you may find useful
- Our Tikkun Olam committee, under the leadership of Chris Lorenzen and Erika Zucker, is gearing up with a number of new and revitalized opportunities for all of us at Touro to participate in social justice work. We are reinvigorating

our Combating Hunger Initiative to consider how our garden might function going forward, to plan our ongoing work with Second Harvest Food Bank, and to develop opportunities to prepare food for those in need. In addition, the Tikkun Olam committee is continuing their work on the ongoing reproductive justice project with the National Council of Jewish Women, a strong voter registration and get-out-the-vote initiative with Together New Orleans, and the development of our Climate Action Plan.

 Liz and Larry Gottfried have agreed to chair our annual fundraiser upcoming on February 2, 2025. They are already hard at work, identifying a committee and planning what promises to be a wonderful evening. That's a high bar after the fabulous "Night in the Catskills" at our last fundraiser, and I know that Liz, Larry and their committee are up to the challenge. I can't wait!

There are so many opportunities for your participation. I hope you will take advantage of them according to your interests and that you find them meaningful. Feel free to reach out to me or to any of the committee leadership to find out more information or to get involved.

At the Annual Congregational Meeting last spring, I described Touro Synagogue as a thriving and growing community. We are a values-based, robust, inclusive, and vibrant community - filled with many special moments and diverse interests. With growth like ours (nearly 25% since 2018!) comes fiscal implications. While it is exciting to be part of a growing community, we understand that with more member households comes more of everything. More diverse interests, more lifecycle events, more people at all of our activities, and more activities to meet the needs of our growing membership. And with more of everything comes more expense. As you know, our Voluntary Annual Support Program is the single major source of funds to subsidize our offerings to the congregation. Literally everything we do at Touro Synagogue is enabled by the generosity of our congregants through this program. I asked you this year to increase your Voluntary Annual Support contributions, if within your reach, and you have responded with love, generosity, and devotion to Touro. Your support is absolutely critical to our mission. Our congregation and our clergy and staff leadership are profoundly grateful for your stepping up to the challenge this year.

We look forward to a wonderful year ahead together, full of joy and meaning within our Touro community and beyond. Renew and Rise

A Message from Rabbi Bauman

Dear Touro Synagogue Family,

As you read this, our global Jewish family will have just observed Tisha B'Av, the 9th of Av, known as the saddest day on the Hebrew calendar. It is such because it is the day upon which we intentionally remember the multiple destructions that we have endured, including

the First and Second Temples, the violent expulsion of Jews from many lands in which we were dispersed, especially the catastrophic exile from Spain in 1492, and other such national tragedies, including now October 7th. These events represent almost inconceivable losses to our people and invite each remembering generation of our community into the lowest possible emotional place, as we read the Book of Lamentations, the Megillah for this Holy Day: How lonely sits the City, once full of people...She weeps bitterly in the night, and her tears are on her cheeks. (Lamentations 1:1-2). Lamentations imagines Jerusalem, and by extension our People, as a wounded and abused woman, her children ripped from her arms, with no one to hear her agonizing cries. She has nothing. And from this dark place, we, the modern embodiment of that City, that People, begin on the 10th of Av to climb.

The ensuing weeks of Av and Elul are a part of that climb. We hear the words of the prophet Isaiah every Shabbat between the 9th of Av and the 1st of Tishrei, comforting and consoling us, reminding us that building a new future with the pieces of a shattered past is the noblest of undertakings. Comfort my people, says your God. Speak tender words to Jerusalem that her fighting has ended, that she is forgiven, that God's outstretched hand is awaiting her. (Isaiah 40:1-2). Isaiah's words are meant to speak to the feeling within every grieving person, no matter the cause of that grief, and coax them - coax us - away from

hopelessness and toward a faith in new beginnings, represented by Rosh Hashanah. It is a powerful story, a universal one; for we all lose, we all hurt, we all wonder with trepidation about what the future will hold, and we all need to hear the simple and profound truth that we do indeed have the strength within us to continually be builders of a better world.

Perhaps it is partly that hopeful message about our endless collective capacity to renew and rise, that brings us back year after year to our synagogue home. The familiar words and melodies, the uniting of family and friends and community, the empty seat beside us that held a loved one just last year, the new lives that have entered the world since last year - all of this tells a story about the magnificent journey that it is to be alive, to learn, to strive, to love, and to construct a sheltering tradition that lasts, generation to generation.

It feels true that we are standing in an historic moment, both as Americans and as Jews. The next few months are of tremendous consequence for the future of our country, the future of Israel, the future of the Middle East, and the future of the world. How we show up as civically-minded Americans, as a committed and reflective Jewish community, as beautiful and broken human beings - these are huge questions that we must answer with as much passion and compassion as possible. And our collective Jewish story of destruction and building, falling and rising, mourning and hoping, is an important source of inspiration for us as we meet the moment we are blessed to inhabit.

It is the honor of our lives as your clergy to hold the space that is the center of gravity for that story, each and every year and especially this one. We eagerly await the powerful moments we will create together in our renewed congregational home. Thank you for all you do, each and every day, to sustain this home, and to infuse it with your soulful presence.



Uptown Hebrew

Hebrew is a part of our tradition that connects us to both our ancient heritage and to Jews all around the world today. The skills that our Uptown Hebrew students learn help unlock doors to a deeper, richer, and more fulfilling Jewish life. At Touro Synagogue, kids especially rely on their Hebrew learning as they begin preparing to become B'nei Mitzvah – a process which requires daily practice that is made easier and more enjoyable by developing strong reading

skills early on.

We are so proud that last year's launch of our new Uptown Hebrew curriculum produced such incredible levels of accomplishment across the board. One of the main drivers of that success is our new method of creating classes based on how much Hebrew a student already knows, and not solely on what grade they are in. This allows everyone to move more easily through our program's three major phases:

Learning to Read: Our beginner students work on mastering the consonants and vowels of the Alef Bet (Hebrew alphabet), as well as some of the basic reading rules that help them assemble these building blocks into sounds; we call this skill "decoding." Most students spend an entire school year in this phase. Each week, our Uptown Hebrew class session begins with an opening ritual and some whole-group prayer practice, followed by time in small groups at three learning stations:

- Reading Practice: one-on-one or in small groups with a teacher
- **Activity Station:** students work with flash cards, practice writing on dry-erase boards, and complete activities that help strengthen any reading difficulties
- **T'filah Station:** students work independently using smart tablets and interactive recordings to practice prayers from the Shabbat service.

Strengthening Skills: Once students have learned the Alef Bet, the next step is to practice using their decoding skills regularly so they can rely upon them for accurate reading. The three goals of this class are **accuracy, fluency, and speed** — the key components for successfully transitioning from sounding out syllables to reading entire sentences and paragraphs.

The weekly structure of this class is similar to Phase 1, with students spending 1-2 semesters in this phase.

Reading to Learn: This is where the magic really happens. Students in this phase use the skills they have now mastered to begin reading comprehension—knowing the meaning of the words they sound out. For this class, our program uses Mitkadem, a self-paced curriculum which teaches vocabulary, basic grammar, and some of the "big picture" ideas regarding the Shabbat-related Hebrew our students encounter most often. It is incredible to watch our kids blend these skills to understand the meaning of entire paragraphs without an English translation. Words they hear often in services become "aha!" moments as they begin to recognize their meaning.

To end each week of Uptown Hebrew, all of our classes join together for a brief evening t'filah service where we sing and pray together. This provides a fantastic opportunity for individual and small groups of students to not only practice what they're learning, but also how to be prayer leaders – a preview of what it will be like on the morning of their B'nei Mitzvah service!



Beyond B'nei Mitzvah

Cultivating Our Emerging Jewish Teen Leaders

It is an exciting time to be a teen at Touro Synagogue, with more opportunities and engaging programming than ever before for continued Jewish learning, celebrating moments, building sacred and honing leadership and professional skills, meeting new friends, and just plain having fun. Over the past year we have all watched our teens radiate enthusiasm and eagerness in carving out a vibrant and welcoming niche

for themselves and their peers here at Touro Synagogue; beyond our walls, too, they have shown their dedication to enhancing and strengthening the Jewish community in all sorts of ways. Now as they return home from summertime adventures, this upcoming year of programming – housed within the **Belle Adelman-Cannon Center for Teen Leadership** – is sure to be our best one ever!

As we shared with you last spring, Touro's new Center for Teen Leadership is the place where all of our congregation's teenagers can explore meaningful avenues for personal and spiritual growth, and then find chances to put their passions

and interests to work for the benefit of the community. Funded through the incredible generosity of the Debra Van der Linden Sidelnik fund, the Ferber Family of Houma Foundation, and individual congregational donors, all of the many current and future opportunities offered through the Center honor the memory and legacy of its namesake: Belle Adelman-Cannon, z"l. Belle was a beloved member of the Touro Synagogue family for their entire life - a devastatingly all-too-brief 17 years. At every turn, Belle showed up with their brilliant smile and unmissable blue hair, ready to seize the opportunity to learn, teach, and lead. Whether it was bringing their radiant joy to Yamim Yafim's teaching team on Sundays, running for a NFTY Southern regional board position to help spur more teens around the South to be active in their Jewish community, or going hoarse from cheering on their Maccabiah (color wars) team at Henry S. Jacobs Camp each summer, there was just no way around loving, respecting, and wanting to emulate the type of person Belle was. And through our community's grappling with the grief over Belle's death, we chose to affix their name to the new Center for Teen Leadership and enshrine their legacy in all that it accomplishes - a guiding light and inspiration for generations to come.

Throughout the year, all of Touro's teens and their families will hear a lot about what the Center has to offer and how they can be part of it all – read on for a sneak peak at what you can expect!

8th and 9th Grade Yamim Yafim

Nestled between B'nei Mitzvah and Confirmation, our 8th & 9th grade class meets every other week on Wednesday evenings. Along with your peers from Temple Sinai, you'll enjoy dinner and schmoozing in the TASTY teen lounge before heading into the kitchen and exploring tastes of Jewish culture from around the world.



TASTY and NFTY Southern

For the second year, we are partnering with Temple Sinai to continue building on the successful relaunch of our joint youth group, TASTY (Touro and Sinai Temple Youth). Throughout the year, TASTY's board of teen leaders invite you to be part of all they are eagerly putting together for you to enjoy: food-filled holiday celebrations; social outings and fun activities across New Orleans like bowling and mini-golf; Tikkun Olam (social action) community service opportunities to help those in need (and get some documented service hours), and much more! TASTY is part of the wider NFTY Southern region of Reform Jewish youth groups, and regional events like Fall Conclave (Little Rock, AR) and Spring Kallah (Utica, MS) are not to be missed.



Madrichim Teaching Assistant Program

Remember those cool teenagers who used to help out in your Sunday school classroom? Well now it's YOUR turn to be just like them! Whether you have worked with kids a lot in the past or are brand new to it, our Madrichim Teaching Assistant Program is a great chance for any teen who wants to build or hone their teaching skills, and to make an enormous impact on the lives and development of our littlest learners.

Yamim Yafim

Fostering Joy and Connection

One of Touro Synagogue's exciting youth programs, **Yamim Yafim**, offers a comprehensive and engaging Jewish educational experience for children in Pre-K through 7th grade. Designed to instill a deep connection to Jewish heritage and values, Yamim Yafim blends handson learning with community building activities, ensuring every child finds joy and connection in their Jewish journey.

The Sunday Yamim Yafim program for Pre-K through 5th graders is a camp-style program aimed at fostering a connection with Judaism through engaging in hands-on learning and relationship building. Throughout the year, students immerse themselves in Jewish values, holidays, Torah, Hebrew, and more, while forming lasting friendships. We are so excited to be back at Touro this year in our newly renovated education building and are looking forward to a great year together.

As students transition to middle school, the Wednesday evening Yamim Yafim program for 6th and 7th graders gives students an opportunity to deepen their Jewish learning as they continue on their journey toward becoming Jewish adults. Throughout the year, students dive into topics like Jewish history, philanthropy, holidays, community involvement, and Israel, all while meeting inspiring guest speakers and going on local trips. This class helps prepare students for their B'nei Mitzvah and teaches them how to be active members of the Jewish community afterward, gaining a strong understanding and appreciation of their Jewish heritage.

Repairing the World

Touro's Tikkun Olam committee is gearing up for another year of social justice action with many opportunities for engagement:

Climate Action Task Force

Led by Touro members Penny Freistadt and Larry Gottfried, our Climate Action Task Force meets monthly to create a Climate Action Plan that will reduce Touro's environmental footprint. This plan is to be adopted by the board on Tu B'Shevat 2025 and submitted as the key requirement of Touro's membership in the Jewish Climate Leadership Coalition.

Reproductive Rights

Our reproductive rights committee works in concert with the National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) which is a leader in the effort to ensure Jewish values are not suppressed. We have a vibrant presence in this work, coordinated by Touro member Gail Pesses. We are hoping to host a series of reproductive rights Havdalah services at Touro this year, as well as learning and action opportunities for adults and teens.

Hebrew Rest Cemetery Association

Jointly Owned by Touro Synagogue and Temple Sinai

"New Orleans December 21st 1871: The undersigned joint Committee of the Hebrew Congregation Shangarai Chassed and Temple Sinai appointed to confer on the subject of an intended use of the Hebrew Rest Cemetery belonging to the said Congregation Shangarai Chassed as a common Burying Ground for both the said..."

The minutes of that meeting end by recommending that both congregations agree to joint ownership and that Temple Sinai pay the amount of "One Dollar" for the transaction. The seven hand-written pages, archived at the Louisiana Research Collection at Tulane University, spell out the proposed relationship, including the rights of the congregations' members and the structure of the Board of Commissioners.

So began the joint relationship that eventually led to the formation of Hebrew Rest Cemetery Association, Inc., jointly owned by Touro Synagogue and Congregation Temple Sinai, which each appoints six commissioners to the Board. The Association operates Hebrew Rest Cemeteries 1, 2, and 3 in Gentilly and Dispersed of Judah Cemetery near the head of Canal Street. The cemeteries primarily serve the two congregations but also are available to serve the greater Jewish Community. We are grateful to have a close working relationship with Jewish clergy and funeral directors throughout the Greater New Orleans area.

At times, we are called upon to provide burial sites for indigent members of the community and are pleased to do so. We are establishing a fund to assist at such times and also to help maintain headstones and plots for families who are no longer here. If you would like to contribute to this fund, please contact us or see the coming link on our web site.

Walking through the cemeteries is truly a walk through the history of the New Orleans Jewish Community. A marker at Dispersed of Judah recognizes the contributions of Judah Touro (originally interred there but subsequently moved to Newport, Rhode Island). At Hebrew Rest, one finds the final resting places of some of the rabbis of both congregations. We encourage you to visit the cemeteries which are open every day except Saturday and the major Jewish Holidays from about 8:30am to 5:00pm. Security is provided at Hebrew Rest every Sunday from 10:00am until 2:00pm.

Available burial sites include traditional in-ground plots, mausoleum crypts, and urn garden niches. Information on pricing as well as a directory of burial sites and other information can be found on our web site at www.hebrewrest. org.
