A Message from Laura Levy

Dear Friends,

Greetings and best wishes to all of you! I hope that you are feeling renewed and inspired after our richly meaningful holiday season at Touro Synagogue. I know you share my gratitude to our extraordinary clergy and staff for their passion and dedication to us. Now, as

we move into the new year, there is much going on at Touro Synagogue as always.

Under the able leadership of Chris Lorenzen, we continue our battle against food insecurity in our community. As you know, we set an ambitious goal this year to collect 2,000 pounds of non-perishable food over the holiday season. Thanks to you, our generous and compassionate community, we were successful in collecting 2,049 pounds of food which we donated to Second Harvest Food Bank. We have appointed a Combating Hunger Steering Committee under Chris's leadership to develop plans for our ongoing work, including the future of our congregational garden. When our much beloved vertical garden was removed during the construction, we learned that the wall on which it was supported had incurred significant damage and we were advised not to re-start the garden in that format. The Steering Committee is tasked with developing a new plan for the garden. They will take on planning for several other goals as well, including continued support of neighborhood food pantries, particularly through our partnership with Second Harvest, and participation in food preparation programs that offer meals served with dignity to those in need. Want to stop into Touro Synagogue on a Sunday morning to make some sandwiches for this purpose? The opportunity may be in your future!

The Caring and Mitzvah Committee is actively working and expanding their vision under the dedicated leadership of Beth Lavin and Ellen Kempner. Those of you who have been recipients of our Meal Train, or have participated as a donor, understand both the joy and the meaning of this important mitzvah. The committee also offers a welcome to new members of our congregation, a "mazel tov" to families welcoming new babies, and comfort to those experiencing life's sadness. Please join us in this important work, the mitzvah of caring for each other. There are opportunities to participate at any level that works for you.

Thanks to the leadership of Membership Chair Julie Koppman and many others, our Ambassador Program is thriving and growing! Their work has focused on fostering community in our congregation, and they have done so in such lovely ways. If you are a new member, please know that a Congregational Ambassador is available to you to help you get to know our

congregation and feel your membership in full. The group has also developed "Membership FAQs" that are posted on our website (under the "About Us" tab). It is packed with useful information for new members and long-time members alike.

I want to let you know that our Board of Trustees has appointed a Task Force to respond to the Union for Reform Judaism's call for a Congregational Ethics Code in each member congregation. Having a written Congregational Ethics Code serves to remind us of the sacred nature of our community and to reinforce the integrity of our Synagogue as a safe, welcoming, and sacred space. It further serves to declare our commitment as a community to act according to high ethical standards. It is the goal of the Task Force to complete their work in the spring of 2025, and I will update you on the process as it moves forward.

Finally, I am excited to tell you about our **annual fundraiser coming up on Sunday, February 2, 2025**. Mark your calendars – it promises to be a lot of fun! Committee chairs Liz and Larry Gottfried and their team have planned a wonderful evening for us. This year's fundraiser, *Sunday Night Fever at Studio 504*, is inspired by the legendary Studio 54, the iconic nightclub that defined the disco era in the 1970s. With musical performances by talented local artists and delicious food, this spectacular evening will be a chance to celebrate, connect, and create lasting memories with the Touro community. We have a special patron party planned as well as some fun perks if you are able to join us at one of the sponsorship levels. Whether you want to dance the night away, sit and enjoy the entertainment, or just spend quality time with your community, it will be an unforgettable evening. There might even be a few surprises...

This is only a sampling of the good work going on every day at Touro Synagogue. There are so many ways to be engaged with this wonderful community. In 5785, may you find a space in the life of Touro Synagogue that is meaningful to you and your family, and may you experience it in full. We on the Board of Trustees and in the Ambassador Program are here to help you.

The Space Between Us

A Message from Rabbi Bauman

Dear Touro Synagogue Family,

As you receive this, many of us will be deep in preparations for the Thanksgiving and Winter Holidays. For some, that means traveling to be with relatives. For others, it means hosting loved ones who are coming to you. For

others, it means looking forward to time with local family or friends. And for others, this season launches a particularly lonely time when who is absent is the sharpest detail. As ever, we experience each day and particularly special days like holidays with a widely varied set of circumstances, pressures, joys, hopes, and pains. It is our pledge to each other, as people who care deeply about building community, that we will see each other, rejoice and mourn together, and humbly make room for many frames of mind in which we enter each others' presence.

The presidential election and all its implications are still fresh on all our minds, and no matter how we voted and why, it is undeniable that we are polarized as a nation and that this reality is shredding the fabric of our precious democracy. In such an environment of alienation and loneliness, the project that is Touro Synagogue is more important than ever. I believe this for two reasons.

The first is that pluralistic community is increasingly rare in this country, but it is the only way to rebuild our social capital, the connective tissue between people that allows us all to reach individual and common goals, allows us to entrust our futures to each other. We must strengthen these ties, even and especially across lines of difference, and our synagogue can be an important training ground for building those skills. The second is that religion has often been used as a weapon of exclusion, as a mechanism by which people are deemed unworthy. As the rhetoric of dehumanization is normalized, especially by certain entities in the religious sphere of this country, faith communities of conscience and care must be a port in the storm.

Both because we need to learn to speak to each other and trust each other and because religion can be a powerful tool not just for destruction but for righteousness, our community has a mandate in this moment to be strong, to be determined, and to be fearlessly loving and affirming.

Yes, this kind of space can get a little messy and requires great humility from everyone. It's harder than the transactional world of fee-for-service we live in most every other time. But I suspect that deep down, each of us yearns to live with authenticity, yearns to know that our lives have meaning, and yearns to feel that we are sitting amongst others who also seek that kind of substantive existence. Jewish philosopher Martin Buber taught a century ago that the encounter of two souls is a holy thing, and that the blessed space between us is where we can find God. In a world that curses that space as evidence of societal rot, let us stand in the breach and insist upon a different way, a way that blesses this space as evidence of the expansiveness of God's image. It's not a small thing to

do, whether in the kind words we speak or the broad initiatives we undertake, and we are up to all of it.

To be the rabbi of a community that not only speaks this commitment but lives it is a true honor. As I enter my 6th year as the Senior Rabbi of Touro Synagogue, I marvel daily - truly, daily, at the privilege of serving you, learning with you, growing with you, and hoping and building for the future with you. Never have these feelings been more poignant than now, as Adam and I prepare to celebrate the Bar Mitzvah

of our firstborn son, Morris Robert Eckstein, whom you likely know as Mo. Raising our family in this community has been a joy, and as this rite of passage approaches in January, we delight that this is the kind of Jewish life our children have the chance to live. So thank you, from a proud mother, for being a part of our family's journey.

Chanukah Candle Lighting Guide 🔭



Chanukah lasts for 8 nights, and on each night, we light one more candle than the night before. Arrange the lights in your hanukkiyah (menorrah) each night starting with the rightmost branches, and the shamash (helper) light in its place.

Place the hanukkiyah where many people can see it, ideally near a window or door.

On the Shabbat of Chanukah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the Shamash - the helper candle - first using it to kindle the rest of the Hanukkah lights; say or sing the blessings below:





Below are the ways to plug in and do a Mardi Gras Mitzvah!

1 | The Grandstand Building Team

Handy with a hammer? Able to follow directions from someone who is? We are seeking volunteers to help assemble the wheelchair-accessible stands outside the sanctuary on Monday, February 17 and to disassemble them on Wednesday, March 5.

2 | The Security and Hospitality Team

Parade viewing with a purpose! We are seeking volunteers to welcome members at the gate of Touro to ensure that everyone who comes in receives a wrist band and is checked in on our list, for security reasons. This includes receiving payments from non-member guests who have not paid in advance.

3 | Krewe of VIPs Host Team

It is our honor each year to host the Krewe of VIPS, and we are seeking volunteers who can welcome and chaperone the group, making sure the children and their families have everything they need to enjoy the parades.

Touro Parade Schedule 2025

Below you will find a schedule of when the synagogue will be open for members who would like to join the revelry of Carnival in New Orleans. Please note, the parades roll in light rain. The officials will only postpone if the weather is predicted to be severe. The local TV and radio news stations (such as WWL Radio) broadcast the hour by hour updates. You can also use the Parade Tracker App to track the parades. Touro will still celebrate Shabbat even if the parades are cancelled due to inclement weather. Feel free to bring your coolers and snacks! Remember, no pork, shellfish, or glass (except that which you are bringing for recycling) allowed.

Saturday, March 1

9:00AM Shabbat Shiur 10:00AM Gates open for parade watching Krewes of Iris and Tucks Stands are reserved for Krewe of VIPs

Touro's facility will be closed for all other Uptown parades that are not listed on this schedule.

Our Mardi Gras Guidelines

- Non-members must be accompanied by a member at all times. Each non-member will be charged \$20 at the door; \$10 for non-member guests under 5 years old.
- Members must remain on site as long as their guests are present.

- No smoking.
