

A Message from Kevin Wilkins

Friends,

I hope you are feeling renewed and inspired after our richly meaningful High Holidays at Touro Synagogue and in the broader Jewish world. Thank you to our incredible clergy and staff for creating the space for all of us to reflect and pray together. I witnessed

something truly remarkable throughout the High Holiday services: a sanctuary filled with congregants gathered as one sacred community. I also witnessed our vibrant family services, watching our children's faces light up as they engaged with our traditions. These moments reminded me why community has always been at the heart of Jewish life.

What I saw during the High Holidays reflects what makes Touro extraordinary. At a time when our world feels increasingly fractured and polarized, Touro offers something essential: a sacred space where congregants from diverse backgrounds come together united by shared values of transformative prayer, expansive thought, fearless engagement, and love. We provide what so many are desperately seeking—a true spiritual home where people feel genuinely known, where children develop Jewish identity with pride and joy, and where everyone can make a real community impact.

Now, as we move into the new year, there is much going on at Touro Synagogue. I want to share updates that reflect our commitment to deepening and expanding our community:

Membership—Our Ambassador Program that supports our growing membership base continues to thrive with several exciting developments. We're introducing Embedded Ambassadors, who will regularly attend ongoing Touro programming (Torah Study, Lunch & Learn, Adult Education, etc.) and help welcome those new to these programs. The Initial Contactors, who reach out to new congregants to connect, answer questions, and offer support; the Social Hosts, who plan casual congregant meet-ups; and the Greeter Groups, who ensure all feel welcomed, are all very active.

A reminder to please make your contact information viewable in the ShulCloud membership directory. If you need help accessing ShulCloud, tutorial resources are available through the office. Once set up, follow the simple steps to make your profile visible to other congregants. Doing so helps us all know and support one another.

Finally, a heartfelt thank you to all who participated in High Holiday ushering, challah delivery, and member phone calls—these actions are vital for building connections. If you

Security—Thanks to our professional staff and lay leadership, we achieved a safe and welcoming High Holiday season. We held professional security training for congregant volunteers, increased our volunteer numbers, and now have robust capacity for professional and congregant security volunteers at all Touro events. Your safety remains our highest priority. Tikkun Olam—Our Tikkun Olam work continues to expand. During the High Holidays, we collected an incredible **3,000 pounds of food**—a new record!—which went to Broadmoor Food Pantry, First 72+, and Second Harvest. Looking ahead, we have several exciting initiatives:

- **Diaper Drive** in November addressing a big need in Louisiana
- Yamim Yafim Sandwich Making Activities restarting this fall, with sandwiches distributed to community fridges around New Orleans
- Nine Street Trees being planted on all three sides of campus in early December, thanks to the Parks & Parkways 2025-2026 Tree Planting Grants Program
- Oyster Shell Bagging Event through Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana (CRCL) on December 13
- "Tuba Shvat" Tree Planting Event with S.O.U.L. NOLA on January 31—brass band included!

Caring and Mitzvah—At Touro, caring for one another is at the heart of who we are. Our Caring and Mitzvah Committee continues to expand their vital work. Each act of kindness—a meal, a thoughtful note, a visit—is a mitzvah that brings love, light, comfort, and connection to our community. Youth Education and Lifelong Learning—Our educational programs are thriving. The community has over **230 children and teens enrolled** across all youth education offerings:

 Yamim Yafim (Sunday mornings): 175 students in pre-K through 5th grade learning Jewish values and living and loving Jewish life

- **Uptown Hebrew (Wednesday afternoons):** 86 students learning to read and reading to learn Hebrew
- Yamim Yafim (Wednesday evenings): 40 6th and 7th graders preparing for B'nei Mitzvah and developing Jewish literacy skills
- Post-B'nei Mitzvah programs: fostering and enhancing positive Jewish identity for 50 teens, including 13 in Confirmation and 11 in Junior/Senior Seminar

And our **lifelong learning programs** offer something for everyone. The innovative framework for the curriculum includes: entry points like Adult Hebrew for beginners and Shabbat Shiur Sacred Study; in-depth examinations of Jewish topics such as our upcoming Book of Judges course and our continued study of the Land and People of Israel; and ongoing dialogue through book clubs and our continuing series on Jewish Ethics. There are also goal-oriented classes in which you can work toward an Adult B'nei Mitzvah or a process of conversion. L'Chayim Celebration—Save the date for Sunday, February 1, 2026! Touro Synagogue will present the prestigious L'Chayim Award to Jill and Dave Israel for their extraordinary service to the Touro Synagogue community. This will be a special celebration that will also serve as our major fundraiser for 5786. Many thanks to Joy and Andy Braun and Caroline and Jeff Good for co-chairing this meaningful event. Financial Sustainability—Touro's broader, deeper footprint requires something essential from all of us: financial support to achieve sustainability. I'm deeply grateful to the many congregants who have responded to the Touro Annual

Commitment. Early results show remarkable support: with over a 50% response rate this far, **total contributions are up significantly,** with one in three increasing by more than 30%, and one in ten more than doubling their annual contribution.

For those who haven't yet made a commitment, we ask that you make one that is meaningful and aspirational. For 2025/26, the cost per household is \$2,750 or \$229/month. For those who can give at or above the household level, please do so, as these contributions build a strong and secure future for all Touro members.

A Message from Rabbi Kowalski

Dear Touro Family,

As of the writing of this message to all of you, we are poised on the brink of the month of MarCheshvan, so named for the mar, bitterness, it contains due to the fact that it is the only month in the entire Jewish calendar that has absolutely no holidays. The hustle and bustle and intensity of Tishrei fully behind us now, Cheshvan comes in as the season truly begins to change, inviting us to pause, take a breath, and recalibrate for the rest of the year that has only just begun. We cannot fully appreciate the pause that times like Cheshvan or Shabbat reinforce for us until we come through all the busyness that precedes it, finally pause, look back, and are able to utter "Wow, look at what we did!" And wow-look at what we did! In the past few months, the hallways have returned to their fullness of sounds and sights, amply filled with children of all ages on Sundays and Wednesdays, each and every age span touched, encouraged, and guided into the spirit of a new year. Our classes are full of both people and learning, as our new curriculum has guided us through the values of teshuvah, repentance and return, and b'tzelem Elohim, being created in the Divine image, each of which are crucial to orienting us to start afresh and move forward.

It will be a jam-packed weekend as that is also our last Sunday of Yamim Yafim for the semester, at which point we will pause again before we come back in January, at the turn of the secular year, again refreshed and ready to continue moving forward together.

This continual, perpetual movement forward, always moving towards something, is an imperative of humanity - we must continue striving to attain what we are capable of. And we know here at Touro, we are capable of so much together. Looking back on the past four months, I almost cannot believe all we have accomplished already, and I am excited by what the next four months holds as well. By then, of course, it will be time for another bulletin, and so that is another message for another time.

Until then, may we continue to move from strength to strength, from frenzy to pause and back to frenzy again, with a solid sense of responsibility, our own inner strength and fortitude, shining a bright light ahead to light the way.

Let's celebrate Chanukah (a little early) with a fried food fest of deliciousness following services on Friday, December 12. Enjoy fried chicken, latkes, a sufganiyot bar, Chanukah games, songs, & more!

We don't want anyone to miss out on this beautiful simcha because of financial concerns. Please let us know privately if you need assistance.





Chanukah lasts for 8 nights, and on each night, we light one more candle than the night before. Arrange the lights in your hanukkiyah (menorah) each night starting with the rightmost branches, and the shamash (helper) light in its place.

Place the hanukkiyah where many people can see it, ideally near a window or door.

On the Shabbat of Chanukah, kindle the Chanukah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the Shamash—the helper candle—first using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights; say or sing the blessings below:







The officials will only postpone if the weather is predicted to be severe. The local TV and radio news stations (such as WWL Radio) broadcast the hour-by-hour updates. You can also use the Parade Tracker App to track the parades. Touro will still celebrate Shabbat even if the parades are cancelled due to inclement weather. Feel free to bring your coolers and snacks! Remember, no pork, shellfish, or glass (except that which you are bringing for recycling) allowed.

4:00PM Gates open for parade watching 5:00PM Shabbat prayers and candle lighting followed by Krewes of Oshun and Cleopatra

Saturday, February 7

9:00AM Shabbat Shiur 10:00AM Gates open for parade watching: Krewes of Pontchartrain, Choctaw, and Freret Stands are reserved for Krewe of VIPs

Thursday, February 12

4:30PM Gates open for parade watching Krewes of Babylon, Chaos, and Muses Stands are reserved for Krewe of VIPs

Friday, February 13

4:00PM Gates open for parade watching 5:00PM Shabbat prayers and candle lighting followed by Krewes of Hermes, d'Etat, and Morpheus

Saturday, February 14

9:00AM Shabbat Shiur 10:00AM Gates open for parade watching Krewes of Iris and Tucks Stands are reserved for Krewe of VIPs

Touro's facility will be closed for all other Uptown parades that are not listed on this schedule.

Our Mardi Gras Guidelines

- Non-members must be accompanied by a member at all times.
 Each non-member will be charged \$20 at the door;
 \$10 for non-member quests under 5 years old.
- Members must remain on site as long as their guests are present.
- Access will be limited to the areas behind the fence, the Bowsky Garden, Shushan Assembly, and chapel bathrooms.
- Coolers are permitted. Coolers must be kept outdoors.
- No pork, shellfish, or glass allowed.
- · No smoking.
- The building and property grounds must be respected by all members and guests, and all trash must be disposed of properly.
