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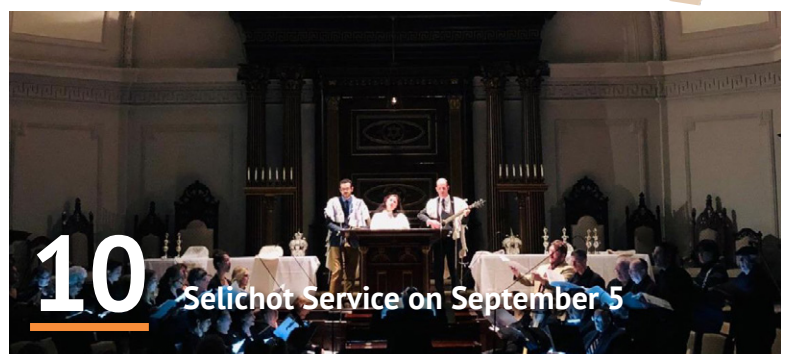

A Message from Kevin Wilkins

Dear Touro Synagogue Family,

I hope summer has been filled with special moments that bring you joy. It is hard to believe that in a few weeks, we will be saying “Shanah Tovah” as we cross the threshold into 5787. During this time of year, I find myself moved by the sight of our congregation filling our historic building. The warmth, the familiar faces, the children who have grown inches since last Rosh Hashanah: this is Touro. This is home.

Jewish life has always drawn its strength from community, and that has never felt more urgent. In a world marked by rising antisemitism, uncertainty, and division, the need for a place where we genuinely belong, where we are known and loved and called to something larger than ourselves, is profound. Touro Synagogue is that place. We don't simply observe Judaism here; we live it together, through prayer, through learning, through showing up for one another in moments of joy and sorrow alike.

This past year has been one of remarkable vitality. **We welcomed 60 new households**, bringing our net total to 740 member households, with over 240 children and teens enrolled in religious school and youth programs. We are actively nurturing the next generation of Jewish life in New Orleans.

Some extraordinary highlights:

- A relaunched Religious School serving over 240 youth PreK–12, with a new curriculum and inspired teaching under Rabbi Kowalski's leadership
- Rabbi Kowalski's formal installation, welcoming her fully into our clergy family
- An incredible L'Chayim event honoring Jill and Dave Israel
- A robust Ambassador Program welcoming new members

and connecting them to our diverse community

- Our most successful High Holiday Food Drive ever, with over 3,000 pounds of food collected and distributed
- Shabbat Dinners, Jazz Fest Shabbat, Shabbati-Gras, and Purim events that brought our community together in joy
- Ongoing security investments ensuring every person who walks through our doors feels safe

Additionally, after a thoughtful 9-month process engaging lay leadership, clergy, staff, and congregants, we are proud to share **Touro Synagogue's 2026-2030 Strategic Plan**, a living framework to guide our decisions, align our energy, and maximize our impact in the years ahead. Thank you to Beth Lavin, Lawrence Haber, Megan Yellin, and the amazing Strategic Planning Committee

for their great work.

We have anchored the plan in our core identity: a historic, thriving Reform Jewish congregation in New Orleans. Our expression of Judaism is egalitarian and respectful of the unique humanity of all.

Our vision and mission are empowering and memorable. The vision is **a strong, vibrant, joyful Jewish future** supported by our mission - to lovingly nurture **a warm, diverse home for Jewish living**, while boldly shaping **a community of purpose and connection**. Both are grounded in six guiding principles through which every congregational decision will be evaluated: *B'tzelem Elohim (God's Image)*, *Klal Yisrael (Jewish Peoplehood)*, *Kehillah Kedoshah (A Holy Community)*, *Tikkun Olam (Repairing the World)*, *L'dor Vador (From Generation to Generation)*, and *Kavanah (Presence and Awareness)*.

The plan is organized around **four strategic pillars**, each with markers of progress:



1. Congregational Engagement

We are committed to an engaged membership at sustainable levels, responding to our growth intentionally without compromising our values or mission. Every congregant should feel connected to at least one member of our clergy, and our Ambassador Program will continue to deepen intra-congregational bonds across all life stages, from young families to retirees.

2. Education

Our youth will be equipped with the knowledge, values, and identity to carry Jewish life forward, through an engaging curriculum that involves their voices in shaping programming. We are committed to ensuring families feel supported and that financial barriers never stand between a child and their Jewish education. For adults, we will offer a multi-pronged curriculum spanning deep dives and flexible specialty topics, meeting congregants wherever they are in their Jewish journey.

3. Tikkun Olam

Our work will make New Orleans a measurably better place to live, work, and worship. With passionate leadership, sustainable committee structures, and dedicated funding, it will be effective, efficient, and easy for congregants of all ages to engage, giving every member a meaningful pathway to repair the world.

4. Bicentennial

Touro was founded in 1828, and in 2028, we will celebrate 200 years. This milestone is an opportunity to build shared identity, deepen pride in our history, elevate our local and national profile, and fuel long-term financial sustainability. We will document and tell our story, elevate signature events like Jazz Fest Shabbat, and engage the broader Jewish community in our celebration.

Supporting all four pillars are **three cross-cutting priorities** embedded across all our work. First, **our clergy** will maintain clear focus across the four sacred duties anchoring congregational life: lifecycle, prayer, holidays, and pastoral care. Second, **our operations work** will sharpen accountability, expand classroom and security capacity, and ensure our infrastructure keeps pace with growth.

Third, Financial sustainability: Year one of our Touro Annual Commitment (TAC) was a genuine success with 65% of pledging households increasing their contributions. We now fund 57% of our total budget through member generosity, up from just over 50%.

Our three-year goal is to fund 70–80% of a right-sized budget, both of which are benchmarks for healthy congregations of our size. For 2026/2027, the **cost per household is \$2,950 (or \$245/month)**. We ask those who can give at or above this level to do so joyfully. Your generosity makes Touro accessible to every family who wants to be here. Economic insecurity will never be a barrier to belonging at Touro. For more about TAC, please see pages 26-27.

As we enter 5787, **I am filled with gratitude** - for our clergy, our staff, our board, and above all, for each of you. Together, we are building a legacy that will inspire Jewish life in New Orleans for generations to come. May this New Year bring health, happiness, and deep meaning to you and your families.

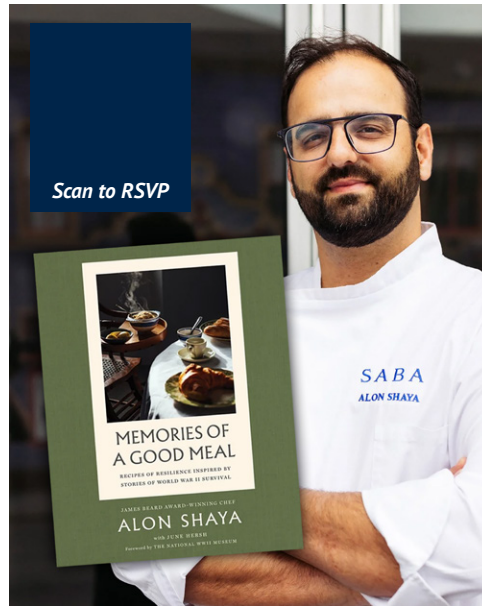

After a special experience together at the Juneteenth Seder at Historic St. James AME Church, we would love to continue the conversation between our multi-faith and multi-cultural communities. In the Jewish community on August 14, we read from the book of Deuteronomy the powerful words "Justice, justice shall you pursue," or in Hebrew, *Tzedek, tzedek Tirdof*. In sanctification of this Biblical charge, let's gather to share prayer, music, food and hopes for the future together.

We'll begin with Shabbat services and a message shared by multi-faith clergy. Following services, please stay for a special Shabbat dinner during which there will be a discussion led by recent graduates of the New Orleans chapter of the Rekindle Fellowship, a national Black-Jewish leadership program. Come meet new people, hear what they've learned about building relationships across communities, and discover how you can stay engaged in this ongoing work.

A Message from Rabbi Bauman

Dear Touro Synagogue Family,

There is a period of time on the Hebrew calendar between 17 Tammuz and 9 Av (corresponding in 2026 to July 2 to July 23) that is called ben ha-metzarim, or “between the straits or narrow places.” It refers to the three weeks in our history between the first breach of the walls of Jerusalem and the ultimate destruction of the city by the Romans in the year 70CE. In

Jewish tradition, it is a time of collective mourning for both current and impending loss, and it is bookended by two fast days. After Tisha B’Av, the second of those fast days, we begin to climb toward the hope and renewal that Rosh Hashanah promises, seeking renewal through teshuvah, unsure of what the future holds but resolved to make it meaningful. This year, I spent most of these three weeks in Jerusalem itself, what’s left of those walls in sight on my walks through the city, and it was for me **a time of deep reflection on the way this calendar maps onto our collective and personal lives.**

To understand what our calendar invites us to personally consider each year, we can ask a very Jewish question prevalent in our midrashic literature: What is this like? (Our sages loved parables.) **For me, the emotions of this “between the straits” time are like the feelings of being the cone of uncertainty of a hurricane, or perhaps the period of time between diagnosis and treatment plan when someone is ill.** Such moments create strictures within which we must each exist for a time, the future hanging in the balance, and it is profoundly disconcerting because there is only so much control we have over the outcome of the situation. **We are compelled to sit within the narrow confines of circumstance and consider the simple and yet profound question of how we will show up within it.** This is like ben ha-metzarim for each individual and family.

The same could be said about many of the collective currents in which we’re caught right now as Americans and as Jews: the reality of brutal wars and mass suffering, the fraying of our communal fabric driven by a toxic media environment and what it brings out in us, the degrading of democratic norms and the suspense of extremely consequential upcoming elections in both countries, the prevalence of virulent and yet casual Jew-bullying and antisemitism on both ends of the political spectrum. **We are vulnerable, much has already been cracked, and much still hangs in the balance. This is ben ha-metzarim for us today. And just as our ancient ancestors came to terms during this time 2,000 years ago with their human limits, we too must acknowledge our own.**

We sense that we too are living in an important moment in history, and we too have finite power and time to influence what happens. So the most pressing question for us as we seek

to live lives of meaning cannot be, “What will happen?” That question can only be answered by our future selves, and it will not help us on our journey of growth toward the new year. The storm is upon us now. The walls are breached now. We are preparing for the new year now. As with the arrival of storms and their aftermath, as with the strong currents of all historical moments, what emerges as most important is what individuals and communities choose to do in response. The stories that continue to empower us are those of the acts of goodness, strength, courage, even heroism in very difficult circumstances, despite and in some cases because of the vast forces acting upon us that we cannot hold back. In the narrowest places, such rebellions against the strictures of major events bring hope and resilience, and are not these the tools we need to face the new year?

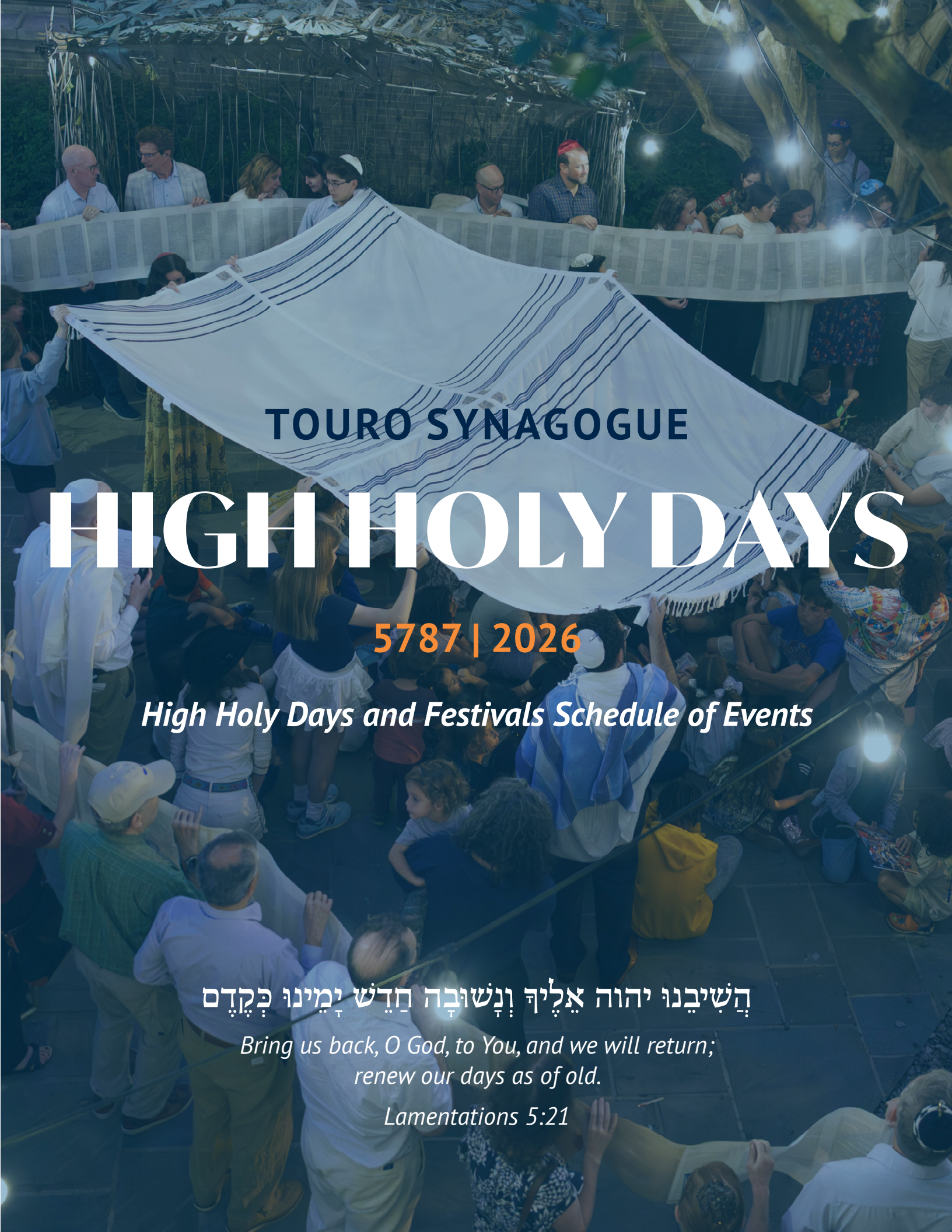
Rabbi Jonathan Sacks (z”l) wrote beautifully of the difference between history and memory, words that I believe speak to this moment in our year and our lives. “History is someone else’s story. It’s about events that occurred long ago to someone else. **Memory is my story. It’s about where I come from and of what narrative I am a part. History answers the question, ‘What happened?’ Memory answers the question, ‘Who, then, am I?’**” This is the question I’d like to put before all of us as we orient toward 5787. Who am I, and who are we, called to be that will make us strong sources of memory for those who come after us. In yet other words, how can we, through the ways we chose to respond to this moment of uncertainty, be ports in the storm, repairers of the breach, and good ancestors?

To be good ancestors to our descendants, we must not only be concerned about history, much of which is beyond our control like a hurricane or a diagnosis or the breaching of the walls in battle, none of which we have the power to avert. If we only concern ourselves with these dictates of history and twists of fate and nature, we will not feel empowered to make changes in our lives, and that is the most urgent call of this time of the year. So we must also and especially pay great attention to the memory we are going to be a part of for the legacy we are building, for the ways we stood up to hard moments by striving to be the best version of ourselves, which is very much within our power.

So our charge as we enter these weeks of spiritual preparation for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is to remember that **we are a part of creating a memory for ourselves and those who follow us ...of people who strove, who leaned into joy when we could, who picked up shards of glass ben ha metzarim, who held onto hope even in the most difficult of chapters. Yes, our metaphorical walls may be breached, our sense of coherence in the world threatened by so much strife and change. But we are still standing, and what we help each other remember about what is possible within us is indestructible if we choose to make it so.**

Unlocking the Door to a Fulfilling Jewish Life

We are thrilled to welcome our new Hebrew learners to join our returning students and dedicated team of teen reading coaches and teachers on Wednesdays. Hebrew is a part of our tradition that connects us to both our ancient heritage and to Jews all around the world today. The skills that our Uptown Hebrew students learn help unlock doors to a deeper, richer, and more fulfilling Jewish life. At Touro Synagogue, kids especially rely on their Hebrew learning as they begin preparing to become B'nei Mitzvah – a process which requires daily practice that is made easier and more enjoyable by developing strong reading skills early on.

Below is a quick overview of what we hope to accomplish this school year:



Alef: Learning to Read

Alef - Learning to Read: Our beginner students work on mastering the consonants and vowels of the Alef Bet (Hebrew alphabet), as well as some of the basic reading rules that help them assemble these building blocks into sounds; we call this skill “decoding.” Each week, our Uptown Hebrew class session begins with an opening ritual and some whole-group prayer practice, followed by time in small groups at three learning stations:

- **Reading Practice:** *one-on-one or in small groups with a teacher*
- **Activity Station:** *students work with flash cards, practice writing on dry-erase boards, and complete activities that help strengthen any reading difficulties*
- **T'filah Station:** *students work independently using smart tablets and interactive recordings to practice prayers from the Shabbat service*



Bet: Strengthening Skills

Bet - Strengthening Skills: Once students have learned the Alef Bet, the next step is to practice using their decoding skills regularly so they can rely upon them for accurate reading. The three goals of this class are **accuracy, fluency, and speed** – the key components for successfully transitioning from sounding out syllables to reading entire sentences and paragraphs.

Gimel & Dalet - Reading to Learn: This is where the magic *really* happens. Students in this phase build on the Hebrew reading skills they have developed in earlier years to deepen their comprehension and understanding. As they continue expanding their vocabulary, strengthening their knowledge of basic grammar, and becoming more familiar with the language of Jewish prayer and tradition, students begin to read not just the words, but their meaning. It is incredible to watch our students connect these skills to understand entire passages of Hebrew without relying on an English translation. Words and phrases they hear regularly during services become exciting “aha!” moments as they recognize and understand them independently.



Gimel & Dalet: Reading to Learn

To end each week of Uptown Hebrew, all of our classes join together for a brief evening t'filah service where we sing and pray together. This provides a fantastic opportunity for individual and small groups of students to not only practice what they're learning, but also how to be prayer leaders – a preview of what it will be like for their B'nei Mitzvah service!

We can't wait to welcome our students back for our first full day on September 9, and to watch all of them learn and grow throughout the year.

Repairing the World

Tikkun Olam

5786 was one of our busiest years for Tikkun Olam to date, with members of the congregation rising to the many challenges facing our city. As we enter 5787, we are building on that momentum with new opportunities to make an impact. Read on to learn more about our accomplishments over the past year and the important work ahead.

Combating Hunger

We hosted our most successful High Holiday Food Drive ever, collecting over 3,000 pounds of food for Second Harvest and Broadmoor Food Pantry. Touro children and teens helped by decorating donation bags and weighing and loading donations.

In response to the government shut down and pause in food stamps this past fall, we quickly leveraged our generous Hunger Fund to directly support community organizations with significant monetary support.

We have expanded our efforts to reduce food insecurity and food waste by donating extra food from Shabbat dinners and Synagogue events to local charities and community fridges. Yamim Yafim students have participated in three sandwich making events to benefit the Harry Thompson Center and Lantern Light. A special thank you to Anna Labadie for organizing our sandwich making events, which have become a favorite activity for our Yamim Yafim students.

After the enormous success of last year's High Holy Day Food Drive, **we have decided to raise our collection goal this year to 4,000 pounds (two tons!)** of non-perishable food items. Second Harvest will be on site Yom Kippur morning to collect donations, but we will accept donations at any time during the holidays. As in years past, be on the lookout for personalized grocery bags, lovingly decorated by Touro's children. It's a shared effort and a powerful mitzvah in which everyone can participate.

Climate Action

Touro remains committed to the environment by maintaining and updating our Climate Action Plan. A new plan was submitted in January 2026 and our committee meets regularly.

Thanks to a grant from the Department of Parks and Parkways, we were able to plant eight new trees around our building to help grow our city's tree canopy and beautify our neighborhood! We also sponsored volunteer opportunities, including tree plantings with S.O.U.L. Nola and oyster shell bagging with CRCL, and hosted sustainable Shabbat dinners with reusable dinnerware.

This fall, the Climate Action Task Force, co-chaired by Monique de la Coeur and Dan Weiner, will roll out their agenda for the coming year. Be on the lookout for additional tree plantings, oyster shell bagging, and other events designed to lessen our impact on the environment!



Immigrant Support

Touro truly met the moment this year in response to supporting our immigrant neighbors during increased ICE operations in our city. Within days, we mobilized hundreds of volunteers to learn about bystander rights and directly help deliver food and goods to our neighbors sheltering in place. In just a few weeks, our community raised over \$100,000 to directly support organizations working on the front lines to protect the rights and safety of immigrants in our city. ***A huge thank you to Anna Herman, Gary Sernovitz, and Scott Saltzman for their tireless work and extraordinary leadership.***



Voting Rights Initiative

Joy Braun and Jill Israel relaunched Touro's Voting Rights Initiative in advance of the crucial midterm elections nationwide. Touro is committed to the Reform Movement's mission: to ensure that every eligible voter has a say in the decisions that impact our lives to create a better future for ourselves and all people. We are working with the non-partisan Religious Action Center and Center for Common Ground to increase voter participation by sending personalized postcards to identified voters in specific states. Welcoming New Babies

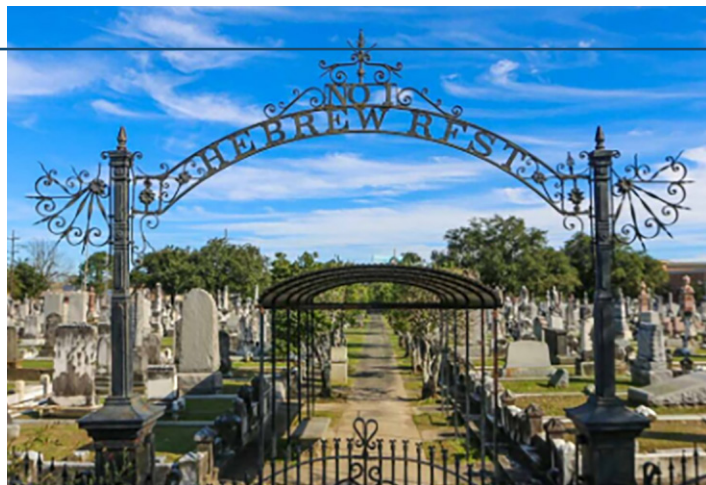
Sending a “Welcome to the Touro Family” onesie and hand-written note to all member families in celebration of new babies.

Since 1881, Touro Synagogue and Temple Sinai have cooperated to meet the burial needs of congregants and others in the New Orleans Jewish community. The two synagogues own Hebrew Rest Cemetery Association, which operates the three Hebrew Rest Cemeteries in Gentilly and Dispersed of Judah Cemetery on Canal Street.

The cemeteries are sacred places of remembrance, honoring our loved ones and preserving our community's history. To fulfill our mission to care for these cemeteries in perpetuity, we need your support. Many of you and your families have purchased perpetual care for the grounds of individual burial spaces. Beyond our perpetual care obligations, we must maintain and repair all of the property, including lawns, shrubbery, sidewalks, and fences. We also have many graves of indigents and persons who were buried before perpetual care was offered. We are fortunate to have land for expansion, which requires investment to develop.
